




### THE LOOP- UX WORKSHOP








### VISIT TO NATIONAL GALLERY OF MODERN ART




## **QUTUB MINAR VISIT**










### CO- WORKING SPACE VISIT

The Circle is a flexible co-working space. At its core, a co-working space is a place to work. This means it's crucial to have areas that are private or simply quiet, where members can focus, On the other hand, a shared office space will always have a wide variety of professionals, so it's also important to have areas where everyone can mingle while working. The Circle has maintained a good balance between spaces. Although built on a Metro Station the space was organised. It was a four-floor Coworking office. The fourth floor was wholly taken over by "ADIDAS" and the remaining floors were occupied by different companies. Some are on the fifth floor taken by software and technology start-ups, social media companies, travel agents, etc. Most of the spaces were divided between different background people. A mix of furniture items gives a feeling of being in different places at the same time. One can enjoy as well as work at the same time. It helps the brain get a fresh perspective, especially for creatives who are stuck in a rut. It is also a powerful tool for stimulating the brain, creating a different mood, or simply taking a break. Some nice coffee, healthy food, fruit, chips, etc. would be good. Bonus: The food station makes an extra area for collaboration. The other features are gym, changing rooms, and personalised touch id-cards access It also has amphitheatre with comfortable seating like a sofa with cushions to work when no event occurs. The design is very informal and instils a sense of comfort in the individuals. Good design isn't just easy on the eyes: It's also a reflection on the type of members a coworking space wants to attract. "The circle" for one had new designs and concepts which was attracting.
